## Fifty Years of Changing and Saving Lives

Dick Caron, a businessman and recovering alcoholic, incorporated the not-for-profit Chit-Chat Foundation on July 1, 1957. Thus began the official story of an organization that has become an international leader in the treatment of alcoholism and drug addiction.

However, for several years prior to the incorporation, Dick and his wife, Catherine, welcomed suffering alcoholics into their home in Wyomissing Hills, PA. When the number of alcoholics seeking help outgrew the house, they purchased a row home in

Reading as a halfway house for male alcoholics, while women continued to use the Caron's home. Finally, realizing a long-time dream, Dick and Catherine opened Chit-Chat Farms in 1959 in a former resort hotel located in Wernersville, PA.



From the outset, Chit-Chat Farms gained fame as a treatment facility for its innovative programs and approaches. In 1969, Chit-Chat expanded its focus beyond alcoholism to become a treatment facility for men and women suffering from the diseases of alcoholism and/or drug addiction. In 1982, Chit-Chat Farms underwent a corporate reorganization and became the Richard J. Caron Foundation. And in 2006, the organization once again changed its name to become Caron Treatment Centers.

Over its 50-year lifespan, Caron has made many advances. To address the needs of families, Caron Family Services was established in 1981. The Jasper G. Chen See, M.D. Adolescent Center opened in 1990. Many buildings have been added to the Wernersville campus; another residential treatment center has been added in Florida; and offices have been opened in New York City, Philadelphia and, most recently, Bermuda. Today, there are 251 beds in Pennsylvania and 87 in Florida. And this past year alone, Caron touched the lives of more than 59,000 individuals in some way.

Although Dick and Catherine Caron have gone to their eternal rest, their unselfish and tireless efforts to help the suffering alcoholic—coupled with their deep spirit of caring and compassion—will serve as the foundation upon which Caron is built for many years to come.

## *1957-2007: Fifty Years of Treatment the Chit-Chat Way*

In July of 1957, Dick Caron, Daniel H. Huyett, 3rd, Thomas K. Leinbach, Rev. Henry J. Huesman and John D. Greif signed Bills of Incorporation to establish Chit-Chat Farms. Those brave visionaries set into motion an organization that over the next five decades would be a pioneer in developing many new treatment procedures that would:

1. Become commonplace throughout the treatment world.
2. Make Caron a leader in standing up for individuals suffering from the disease of addiction and helping the general public understand that recovery is possible.
3. Realize that in order for people to receive treatment, charity care would need to be a critical focus of Caron's work, ensuring that Dick's vision of one drunk helping another would be fulfilled.

Those characteristics that were so evident in 1957 are still the hallmarks of what makes Caron Treatment Centers such a remarkable and special organization 50 years later.

We continue to celebrate that pioneering effort by looking toward research to provide better treatment protocols that help patients suffering from co-occurring disorders. We continue to serve as a leader by fighting discrimination for those who suffer from the disease of addiction by supporting the Paul Wellstone Mental Health and Addiction Parity Act in Congress. And, we continue to make more treatment resources available by growing our beds and programs, setting the standard, and making more charity care available to those in need. Caron provided \$7.7 million in charity care to patients during the 2006-2007 fiscal year, which is more than any other treatment center in the country.

2006-2007 was the best year that Caron has ever had by any business measurement—best bottom line and increased revenue, patients served and funds raised. It was the best year by the standards that make Caron a special organization: more help provided to those in need, more families put back together, more relationships mended, and more hours of prevention and education services in schools.

The phone calls, the letters and the comments from patients and alumni reflect the same spirit of caring and compassion that Dick and his visionaries had 50 years ago, and that the board of directors and staff today are equally committed to. There is something special about Caron, and it's not about statistics. It's about a spirit that people feel when they're on the campus and around Caron staff and other alumni. Fifty years later we're equally as committed to making sure that the very special Caron spirit lives on into the future—just like the AA Prayer: "for that we are responsible."

Thanks to all of you for helping to make Caron's 50th Anniversary year the best year ever. We hope you will stay connected for the next 50 years to help ensure that the Caron spirit lives on.

## Happy 50th

Caron's 50th Anniversary year has proven to be the most successful year in its history. I'm sure Dick and Catherine Caron would be thrilled to see how their vision is still alive and growing today.

The successes and accomplishments we've made this year have been a total team effort, ensuring quality treatment for our patients and their families. This measurement of quality excellence and world-class treatment continues to be substantiated by the outstanding satisfaction results we've received from patients, families and referrals.

"Integration and co-occurring" became key words during the year. With renewed emphasis on total integration of all disciplines into the treatment planning and counseling process, we have developed quality performance incentives and a totally integrated approach in all of the treatment units. Since approximately 70% of Caron's patients are admitted with a co-occurring psychiatric disorder, our psychology/psychiatry staff has steadily increased in each of the past six years. This year, Caron increased its clinical expertise with the addition of Dr. Susan Blank, M.D. As a result, we needed to assure that our philosophy remained consistent with our treatment approach and revised it to:

*The treatment program at Caron is philosophically consistent with the principles formulated by the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous and other 12-Step programs, delivered through the mechanism of the patient community and clinical interventions. Through the utilization of multi-disciplinary assessments, development of an integrated treatment plan based upon assessments and the provision of counseling, education and peer support groups, the patient will receive a wide range of services to address core issues of alcoholism and other drug addiction and to increase their motivation for continuing care.*

We continue to focus on providing measurable, substantiated outcome results in partnership with the University of Pennsylvania and Treatment Research Institute.

Always at the heart of what we do are Dick Caron's simple words, "If you want to drink that's your business...If you want to stop drinking, that's our business." This philosophy has been working for 50 years, and will continue to be the guiding philosophy of treatment at Caron.

Helping more people... better! This continues to be Caron's main focus and 2006-2007 proved to be another terrific year.

- Patient, family and referral satisfaction exceeded expectations.
- Caron's new Quality Performance Indicator Evaluation System was put into place. This system provides monthly evaluations of clinical staff to ensure the provision of quality treatment.
- Susan Blank, M.D., an addictions psychiatrist, was hired to serve as vice president of Treatment Services. Dr. Blank has extensive experience in addictions and co-occurring disorders.
- The Recovery Care Management/Focused Continuing Care outcome project continues.
- Caron's Adolescent Treatment Program celebrated one year smoke-free and the Young Adult Male Program celebrated one year of operations.
- Enhanced work with family members became a top priority with the addition of family therapists to the staff in the Young Adult Male Program and the Adult Extended Care Program.

As always, we are committed to the importance of 12-Step based treatment programs to help our patients achieve Recovery for Life.

Caron enjoyed another year of record financial performance while executing significant growth plans and positioning the organization well for the future. Solid financial performance allows Caron to operate with ever-growing revenues and maintain a conscious focus on containing expenses. With a record bottom line, Caron will continue to expand its mission and reinvest in its future.

Some highlights of Caron's record-setting financial performance are:

- Net patient service revenue grew by \$6.2 million.
- Caron provided \$7.7 million worth of charity care.
- Net assets grew by \$9.4 million.
- Caron's Endowment grew by \$4.4 million to over \$10.7 million.

All in all, it was a terrific 50th Anniversary year financially as we carry on Dick and Catherine's legacy.

Total charitable giving to Caron's Annual, Capital and Endowment Programs for the 2006-2007 fiscal year topped out at \$5.7 million. This figure represents a \$200,000 increase in charitable giving from the previous year.

Support of our 2006-2007 Annual Fund Campaign – the heart of Caron's treatment scholarship program – generated \$4.3 million in charitable gifts. These generous gifts of hope and healing directly benefited individuals and families who lacked the adequate financial resources to access the treatment they so desperately needed.

Additionally, 2006-2007 marked the launch of Caron's 50th Anniversary Campaign—"A Special Place... A Special Time." This \$50 million campaign, to be conducted over five years, will support Caron's annual, capital and endowment needs set forth in Caron's bold strategic plan for the future. As of June 30, 2007, early leadership pledges to the campaign reached \$10.4 million.

Caron will approach this national campaign by region, beginning with its home county of Berks and will expand to surrounding regions as the campaign continues through 2011. A national kickoff for the campaign is planned for 2008.

Caron’s 50th Anniversary year has truly been an historic year. With our core values firmly in place – Commitment, Leadership, Financial Success and Growth – Caron’s connection to our employees and their connection to Caron came shining through.

Caron experienced its lowest turnover in over 10 years and remained virtually 100% staffed in key clinical positions throughout the entire year. The dedication the staff shows to patients and to each other is truly amazing. Patients, families, referents and outside vendors always express such deep appreciation of how knowledgeable, helpful and compassionate Caron’s staff is on a daily basis.

Throughout the year, focus continued on the Caron Connection, Caron’s corporate culture initiative. Several teams comprised of Caron department leaders worked on key issues, which had risen to the top of employees’ concerns according to an employee survey. Three teams were established to work on:

- Improving communication.
- Improving departmental cooperation and assistance.
- Empowering employees.

Several key recommendations already have been implemented as a result of these teams and the work continues.

Caron’s Healthy Connection program also gave us wonderful returns. The results show that Caron’s workforce is more focused on healthy lifestyle choices – nutrition, exercise and preventative healthcare. With this program as a leading factor, Caron’s healthcare benefit costs were reduced by close to 15%! Several times over the past year, Caron has presented the success of its Healthy Connection program to local human resources professionals.

Commitment to training and developing Caron staff has continued to be a key focus. Caron has 15 employees attending an on-campus Master’s of Counseling Psychology program (through Rosemont College, PA). Caron pays over 85% of the tuition cost. Also, Caron’s clinical management staff has worked diligently to implement a stronger model of clinical supervision—one that focuses strongly on skill development. Dr. David Powell, a leading industry expert on this subject, has commented that Caron has one of the best clinical supervision models in the country.

All in all, I know Dick and Catherine would be so proud of the commitment and dedication of Caron’s employees.

- Harris Stratyner, Ph.D., CASAC, was hired in 2006 as the regional vice president of Caron New York. Dr. Stratyner is a world-renowned clinician and highly regarded co-occurring disorders specialist.
- The 12th Annual New York City Gala, which honored Ann Dexter-Jones, an international philanthropist, writer, Reiki master and socialite, raised nearly \$900,000 for funding programs at the New York office.
- New York held its 2nd Annual Community Service Awards Program at the 3 West Club, with more than 250 people in attendance.
- More than 300 people attended the Annual New York Alumni & Friends Reunion.
- The New York office served more than 6,000 individuals through consults, activities and support services this past year.

- The 7th Annual Philadelphia Award of Excellence Dinner, which honored Brian Deuperreault, chairman of ACE, Ltd., raised over \$400,000 for treatment scholarships and attracted a record attendance - 500 people.
- Bi-weekly group meetings for parents of adolescent and young adult alumni are held at the Philadelphia office.
- Caron's Philadelphia Alumni Chapter Group continues to have strong leadership and has grown in attendance and its number of activities. The first annual comedy night in May raised \$10,000 for regional scholarships.
- Regional patient revenue increased 14% over the previous fiscal year.
- Regional giving increased by 40% over the previous fiscal year.
- A Regional Educational Council was established, which consists of a small group of private school guidance counselors who work with children struggling with substance abuse issues.

- Expansion at the Renaissance residences allowed for an increase in bed capacity from 45 to 84 treatment beds, with additional growth of 28 transitional opportunities. Census throughout the year was 90%.
- Construction is underway for Renaissance's new 22,000-square foot treatment space at the Beacon Square Office Complex in Boca Raton, FL.
- Renovating and refurbishing the existing Renaissance residences continues. The tremendous facelift has shaped the complex into a living environment that enhances the patient's experience. The renovation will allow extended care and the Residential Family Restructuring Program to grow.
- Dr. Stanley Evans, medical director, is in his second year of evolving the tele-medicine video conferencing into the treatment process. His integral role in implementing this high-tech capability has resulted in expanding services for potential patients, referral sources, families and alumni. This conferencing has been used for interventions, medical assessments and follow-ups, and clinical aftercare sessions with alumni.
- Fundraising events continued their success, raising more than \$600,000. The Inaugural Capital Campaign was launched at the board of directors level and plans to move into the formal phase by 2008.
- An alumni relations specialist was hired, which will enhance Renaissance's continuum of care and Recovery for Life philosophy. Also, a patient advocate joined the staff to help ensure the Caron standard of excellence in addiction treatment.

# Endowment: A Fund to Ensure Caron's Future

*Caron continues to grow and develop thanks to the generous support of alumni and friends. As we embark on the largest campaign in Caron's history, we recognize the importance of increasing Caron's Endowment and thereby creating a solid foundation for the future of recovery. Studies have shown that addiction is a family disease that can be passed from one generation to the next. Caron's Endowment will ensure that the "Magic Mountain" experience will be available for our children and grandchildren should they need it.*

*The Endowment Fund generates a predictable, reliable income stream that guarantees Caron's long-term financial health and provides financial assistance for individuals and families in need.*

*Currently the Endowment is at \$10,564,917. When speaking with alumni and friends about Caron's 50th Anniversary Campaign: Caron – "A Special Place...A Special Time," the Endowment was mentioned time and again as a priority for ensuring Caron's future ability to provide world-class treatment. Caron's board of directors has a long-term goal of building Caron's Endowment to \$25 million, which will provide an estimated annual income stream of \$1.25 million to support a variety of Caron's financial needs, foremost, patient aid.*

*Caron encourages gifts of securities, real estate, life insurance and life income arrangements such as charitable trusts and gift annuities.*

## *Creating a Lasting Legacy and Tribute Through Endowment Funds*

A number of Caron alumni and friends have named endowed funds to help advance Caron's charitable mission through philanthropy. In many cases, named funds have been established in memory of a family member, loved one or friend. Named endowed funds can be designated for a specific purpose such as treatment scholarships, research, positions, staff development, capital improvements, building maintenance and equipment.

These funds are invested as part of Caron's Endowment. Caron distributes a portion of the revenue earned each year in accordance with the intent and purpose of the fund. Because the funds can be added to over a period of years, they have a tremendous impact on the amount of scholarship aid Caron can award.

With the help of the families, Caron's staff is creating histories of the individuals and families who are honored through the endowed funds. Through this Caron connection, scholarship recipients and their families can gain an understanding of the person or family who made treatment possible and why the fund was established at Caron.

### **Caron Treatment Scholarships**

Funds for individuals seeking chemical dependency treatment.

#### *James Billerbeck Endowed Scholarship Fund*

Established in 1997 in memory of James Billerbeck by his family and friends. This endowment is currently at \$169,595 and provides \$6,108.40 in scholarship support each year.

#### *John J. Flannery Endowed Scholarship Fund*

Established in memory of John Flannery by the Caron board of directors, his family and friends. This endowed fund of \$219,672.23 provides \$8,431.39 in scholarship aid each year.

*Charles A. Leeds, Jr. Endowed Scholarship Fund*

Funded in 2002 by Susan Bridges and her children in memory of her husband Charles A. Leeds, Jr., this fund has reached \$438,290.77 and will award \$18,261.64 next year in scholarship support.

*Martin E. Mulhern Endowed Scholarship Fund*

Established in December 2006 by Martin Mulhern's parents to honor his memory, this fund will be awarded for the first time during the 2008-2009 fiscal year.

*Vivian E. Niceley Endowed Scholarship Fund*

Established in the fall of 2007 by her husband and daughters in memory of Vivian Niceley, this fund provides scholarship support to women seeking relapse treatment and will be awarded for the first time in the 2008-2009 fiscal year.

*Patrick Rogers Endowed Scholarship Fund*

Established in memory of Patrick Rogers by his family and friends in 2001, this scholarship has grown to \$743,105 and awards \$31,000 in scholarship support each year to adolescents seeking treatment.

*John and Sandra Taylor Endowed Scholarship Fund*

Established in 2007 to provide scholarship aid to families from selected counties in New York state, this fund will be awarded for the first time in 2008-2009.

***Family Education Program Scholarships***

Providing scholarships to support family education.

*Rev. William J. "Father Bill" Hultberg Endowed Scholarship Fund*

Established in 2001 to commemorate Father Bill's 70th birthday by the Caron board of directors, his family and friends. This scholarship helps bring families back together through scholarship support for family education. Additional gifts were made to the scholarship this year with a surprise "Birthday Card

Shower." Father Bill could not have been more pleased with people's kindness and generosity. The scholarship is currently at \$128,844.01 and provides \$4,921.83 in scholarship support each year.

***Family Treatment Scholarships Through Caron's Center for Self Development***

Providing funds for individuals who need treatment at Caron's Center for Self Development.

*Richard D. Kelley Endowed Scholarship Fund*

This fund was established in memory of Richard Kelley by Caron's board of directors, his family and friends. Funds from the Annual Richard Kelley Golf Tournament help to grow this scholarship each year. The current endowment has reached \$141,593.84 and awards \$5,237.84 in scholarship support each year.

*Ivan L. Small Endowed Scholarship Fund*

Established in 2001 in memory of Ivan Small by his family and friends for individuals from the state of Maine. This fund has reached \$45,165.65 and this past fiscal year helped two residents from Maine attend Caron's Codependency Workshop.

*Frederick Allen Smith Endowed Scholarship Fund*

Established in December 1999 by the Andryc family in memory of their uncle, Frederick Allen Smith. This endowed fund has reached \$127,681.01 and provided six scholarships this year.

Established in 1989 by Suzanne Voisin-Wickham for individuals from Titusville and western Pennsylvania. This \$49,843.90 endowment provided financial assistance for five individuals this year.

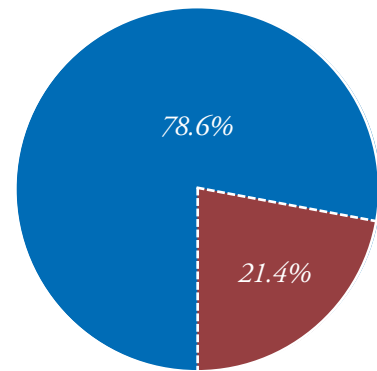

## Caron's 50th Anniversary Campaign *Ensuring the future.*

Caron celebrated its 50th Anniversary in 2007. To catapult Caron into its next 50 years of service, the board of directors has set forth a robust strategic planning initiative to ensure Caron's strong, dynamic and innovative leadership in the field of addiction treatment. To accomplish this, we are embarking on a major national fund raising campaign:

### *A Special Place...A Special Time.*

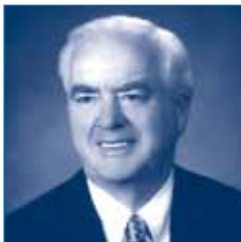
We are honored to have Christopher Kennedy Lawford agree to serve as our National Capital Campaign Advisory Committee Chairman. The campaign goal is to raise \$50 million to fund capital improvements, annual fund scholarships and endowment support to secure Caron's future.



The capital improvements at our Wernersville campus include:

- \$2.5 million for a 24-bed adolescent treatment facility designed for primary treatment (initial 30 days) of adolescent males.
- \$2.5 million for a 21-bed young adult facility designed to house a breakthrough program for young men aged 20 to 27.
- \$2.5 million for a state-of-the-art fitness center available to patients of all ages with a special emphasis on use by adolescents.
- \$2.5 million for a new adolescent dining facility to accommodate the increased number of adolescents and family members.

At our New York Regional Office we seek to raise \$3.5 million, which will be used to retire the remaining debt on our building, and begin to build an endowment to support operating costs. Our Florida center, Caron's Renaissance Institute, also seeks to raise \$3.5 million to renovate and expand its existing residences in Delray Beach and establish a new clinical operations center in Boca Raton.



Of the total \$10 million sought for capital improvements at Wernersville, \$2.5 million will be raised from Caron's friends and supporters in Berks County, Pennsylvania. The Berks Campaign began in December 2007. Terrence J. McGlenn, a former Caron board member and long-time supporter, is serving as the campaign's honorary chairman.

Plans are currently being developed for additional regional campaigns across the country with a national kickoff celebration on Caron's main campus in 2009.
